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
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

This year Roseburg celebrates its 150th birthday. As we invite you to come and experience the Roseburg we know and love today, we also invite you into its rich past that is still a vibrant part of the present community and culture. Similar to today, Roseburg began attracting people over 150 years ago for its ideal climate and expansive resources in timber, gold, fur trading, farmland, and wildlife. Aaron Rose was the first settler in 1851, and the town was officially incorporated in 1852. First named "Deer Creek," it was changed to "Roseburgh" in 1857 and then the spelling changed to "Roseburg" in 1894.

With the Oregon and California Railroad extending to Roseburg, making it the southern-most terminal on the railroad line from Portland and by 1884, stretching into California – Roseburg saw even more settlers and an economic boom. Downtown Roseburg soon hosted large retail department stores and presidents. Roseburg began adopting nicknames such as the "Agricultural Empire," the "Timber Capital of the Nation," and the "Gateway to Crater Lake."

By the 1900s, Roseburg was continuing to flourish in its mining operations, cattle ranching and agriculture. In 1905, timber climbed to the top of the local industry with sales exceeding one million dollars. Within 40 years, sawmill operations in the county grew to 278. Roseburg Lumber (now Roseburg Forest Products), Weyerhaeuser, Champion, and Sun Studs (now Lone Rock Resources) became well-known names.

On August 7, 1959, the Gerretsen Building Supply Company caught fire in downtown Roseburg. Earlier in the evening a Pacific Powder Company truck, with two tons of dynamite and four-anda-half tons of blasting agent nitro carbo nitrate, had been parked in front of the building unnoticed. The truck exploded, destroying buildings in an eight-block radius and severely damaging 30 more blocks. A total of fourteen people died in what is known as the Roseburg Blast.

Throughout the following decades, Roseburg has had to crawl out of the ashes and get back on its feet - not only physically rebuilding, but economically as well. Like many other Oregon timber towns, Roseburg has had to shift some focus. Still a national leader in wood products, other local industries such as tourism, wine, agriculture, outdoor recreation, and the growing medical community are providing vibrancy, progression and a continual growth in economic health. Downtown there has been a steady climb of historic buildings being brought back to life, new businesses moving in, and a collective enthusiasm and determination from the community for Roseburg to thrive again.

150 years later, Roseburg has aged well. It has been innovating, growing and raising the bar since its beginning, and yet still seems youthful and full of untapped potential. The culture continues to be one that embraces hard work, entrepreneurship, small businesses, family and community, exploration, education, and adventure. Roseburg has accomplished so much throughout its history, and the best is still to come.

How to Get Here

On Interstate 5, Roseburg is 67 miles south of the state's second-largest city, Eugene, and 123 miles north of the California border. Roseburg is also about 80 miles inland from the Pacific Coast, 79 miles to Diamond Lake at the summit of the Oregon Cascades, and just 20 miles farther to Crater Lake National Park.

Located within the city limits, private planes and helicopters utilize the Roseburg Regional Airport - a general aviation airport offering traditional airport services. The Rogue Valley International Airport is 97 miles south of Roseburg, and the Eugene Airport is approximately 80 miles north of Roseburg.

Climate

Many compare Roseburg to the climate of the Mediterranean with its varied seasons and mild climate. July and August are the warmest, averaging 85 degrees; January is the coldest with a low averaging 36 degrees. Rainfall averages 35 inches per year and snowfall averages 1 inch per year. On average there are 182 sunny days in Roseburg, and the city has one of the lowest average wind velocities in the United States.

Did You Know?

- » Country singer Johnny Cash mythologized Roseburg loggers in the 1960 song "Lumberjack."
- » Roseburg, also known as the "Gateway to Crater Lake," is only 86 miles from the National Park.
- » HillCrest Vineyard in Roseburg is the oldest continually-operating post-prohibition estate winery in Oregon and birthplace of Oregon's pinot noir.
- » Fishing in Douglas County is globally recognized. Diamond Lake is not only one of the best fishing lakes in Oregon for big trout, but is known as the best ice-fishing lake in the state. The North Umpqua River is known for its fly fishing, often attracting professional fishermen and celebrities.
- » Mt. Thielsen is known as the "Lightning Rod of the Cascades," standing 9,148 feet at the peak. It's a

popular and very adventurous hike to the top.

- » Blueberries are another widespread crop in Roseburg with Norris Farms being the state's largest producer.
- » Douglas County has a 210-day frost-free growing period which is the best for the state of Oregon.
 Douglas County has one of the most diverse soil profile maps in the entire state with around 230 soil profiles.
- » Roseburg's elevation is approximately 500 feet with its highest point being the hill west of Interstate 5, Mount Nebo. Through the 1980s, Nebo was known for its pack of wandering angora goats. Residents said they could predict the weather by watching where the goats were on the mountain. If they were high, the weather would be good. If rain was pending, the goats moved down.
- » Roseburg has two Sister Cities: Aranda De Duero, Spain and Shōbu (was merged into Kuki), Saitama, Japan.
- Nestled in the Cascade Mountains and neighboring Diamond Lake, Mount Bailey is the country's longest-running backcountry cat skiing operation.

Industries

Leading industries: Medical; Timber; Wine

Roseburg's medical services industry employs the highest percentage of residents with CHI Mercy Health Mercy Medical Center and the Roseburg Veterans Affairs Medical Center being the largest.

Abby's Pizza: The pizza chain known throughout the Pacific Northwest was founded 57 years ago and still has its headquarters in Roseburg.

Umpqua Dairy: Founded 90 years ago, the Roseburgbased dairy is the largest in southern Oregon and is distributed all over the western United States.

Roseburg Forest Products: Founded in 1936 as Roseburg Lumber, the company now manages more than 600,000 acres of timberland in Oregon, Virginia and North Carolina, and has approximately 3,000 employees making it the fifth largest private company in Oregon.

The Ford Family Foundation is a private, nonprofit foundation with headquarters in Roseburg. The Foundation provides grants to public charities and agencies that aim to improve the wellbeing of children, families and communities in local rural regions, including a scholarship program for students attending college or university.



Roseburg is your gateway to endless outdoor adventures. No crowds - just room to breathe. When you want to get away and spend some time relaxing in the forest by the river, Roseburg's backyard playground is waiting for you.





The Cascade Mountain Range in southern Oregon has inspired generations with its natural beauty. At the base of these mountains are forests, rivers and lakes providing a playground for those who like getting dirty or a little lost.

Hike

The Umpqua National Forest has a seemingly endless network of hiking trails that showcase lush forests, stunning geological features and mountain spring-fed bodies of water. Trail difficulty spans terrains for the beginner to the advanced hiker. The North Umpqua Trail gives hikers the opportunity to hike 79 miles along the North Umpqua River, though segments of the trail are currently closed due to forest fire damage. Contact the Roseburg District Bureau of Land Management offices or Umpqua National Forest office for current conditions.

Camp

There is no shortage of scenic campsites in the Umpqua Valley. There are over 40 developed campgrounds in the Umpqua National Forest alone and even more dispersed camping options. Here you can find a sparsely occupied campground along the river or lakes and let the fresh air fill your lungs. Discover what camping should be. For fun on the farm, vineyard or other exclusive outdoor experiences, visit Airbnb, Harvest Hosts, or HipCamp for unique camping spots.

Rock Climb

Rock climbing areas around Roseburg include the Callahans, Honeycombs, Eagle Rock, Acker Rock and many others. There are few established routes in these areas, making room for many first ascends. When climbing on privately owned land always make sure you have permission, clean up after yourself and leave the climbing area better than you found it.

Mountain Bike

The North Umpqua Trail (NUT) is on every serious mountain biker's radar as a rugged single track provides a challenging new adventure. Parts of the NUT are currently closed due to fire damage and segments of the trail are currently being improved upon contact the Roseburg District Bureau of Land Management offices or Umpqua National Forest office for current conditions. Developed mountain biking areas near Roseburg include Cooper Creek Reservoir and Champagne Creek. Check Experience Roseburg's event listings for local biking events.

Waterfalls

We highly encourage chasing waterfalls here in the Umpqua Valley. In fact, Highway 138 (The Rogue-Umpqua Scenic Byway) which follows the North Umpqua is nicknamed "the Highway of Waterfalls" since there are over 15 waterfalls right along the highway. Many of these waterfalls don't even require a hike to view, but if you prefer to hike there are also plenty of waterfall trails. pqua National Forest - Mt. Thielsen

Play in the Water with the second sec



When hot summer days start rolling in, the North Umpqua River is great for whitewater rafting and floating. Our streams offer countless swimming holes or head to one of the local lakes or reservoirs to enjoy a variety of water sports. During the colder months, the water is still the place to be with worldrenowned fly fishing as well as some of the best ice fishing in the country.

Fish

The North Umpqua River features some of the greatest fly fishing in the world. Just a few miles east of Roseburg you'll find a 33.8-mile fly-fishing-only paradise. In the cool waters of this section of the North Umpqua River you'll find steelhead and cutthroat trout, coho and Chinook salmon. Diamond Lake is stocked with trout and during the winter months is one of the few places in Oregon to go ice fishing. Though the area is known for its steelhead fly fishing, there are options for those looking to cast a wider net. From drift boat fishing along the Umpqua River to lake fishing for trout in the High Cascades or bank fishing along the North Umpqua, you're bound to get hooked on the fishing experiences that the Umpqua Watershed has to offer.

Umpqua River

On hot summer days, the North Umpqua River will be decorated with sun-seekers in floating devices. There are several sections of the North Umpqua that are close to town and great for floating in a tube or an inflatable kayak. Further up river, in the wild and scenic section of the North Umpqua, you'll find class I to IV rapids – perfect for those looking for more action. Whitewater rafting tours are available, check experienceroseburg.com for more info.

Lakes & Reservoirs

Ben Irving Reservoir, Cooper Creek Reservoir and Galesville Reservoir are all close to town and are great places to take out the boat or stand-up paddle board. Head east out of town up to the KOA resort, Lemolo Lake and you'll find a 540-acre boating and fishing lake with beautiful views of Mount Thielsen and the surrounding hills. Lemolo Lake also has pontoon boats, fishing boats, canoes, pedal boats, kayaks and paddle boards available for rent. Lemolo Lake and nearby Toketee Lake are known for their German Brown Trout fishing. Diamond Lake is also stellar for fishing, kayaking, paddle boarding, and canoeing (no-wake lake).

Swim

Every creek and river in the Umpqua Valley seems to hide a picture-perfect swimming hole. Odds are you'll have an entire swimming hole to yourself, even on weekends. If you do see a crowd along the river, it's likely a swimming hole worth checking out. Umpqua Community College, as well as South Umpqua Memorial Pool in Myrtle Creek, offer outdoor community swim. Fir Grove Park in Roseburg is also a good option for cooling off with their public splash pad.

Our Lakes

Crater Lake National Park

Roseburg is your gateway to Oregon's only National Park - Crater Lake. This must-visit sight has unbelievable views of the deepest lake in the United States. The park is a great place to learn about geology, nature and history. The park features plenty of hiking, biking and camping during the summer, as well as snowshoeing and cross-country skiing during the winter. Rangers also offer guided snowshoeing tours (weather permitting). Spend a few cozy nights at the historic lodge, which is open during the summer. Crater Lake National Park is open year-round, but the North Entrance (the closest entrance to Roseburg) typically opens in early June and closes in late October.

Diamond Lake

Diamond Lake is referred to as the "Gem of the Cascades," and its beloved resort recently turned 100 years old. This natural lake has seemingly endless activities - from one season to the next. Summer fun at the lake includes fishing, swimming, boating, and camping. Snowy winters offer up crosscountry skiing, snowshoeing, ice fishing, cat skiing Mt. Bailey, and an epic tubing hill that includes a 470-foot wonder carpet conveyor lift and multiple tubing lanes. The Diamond Lake Resort offers a cozy place to stay, famous pizza and an incredible July 4 fireworks show. Given the lake's location between Mt. Thielsen and Mt. Bailey, the views around Diamond Lake are unbeatable no matter what time of year.

Head east into the Cascade Mountain Range for some serious winter fun. Diamond Lake offers up plenty of space for those searching for backcountry skiing, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, ice fishing or downhill tubing.

Snowshoe


For those who like to hike in the snow, snowshoeing is a great way to see the forest while it's covered in a white blanket. During the winter months, Crater Lake National Park offers guided snowshoe tours while Diamond Lake also has an abundance of groomed trails to snowshoe on.

Cross-Country Ski

Cross-country skiing is a great way to explore parts of the Umpqua Forest during the winter months. Near Diamond Lake there are seven miles of groomed trails and over 35 miles of backcountry trails. The marked trails provide paths for skiers of all ability levels. There are other places to cross-country ski beyond Diamond Lake, be aware they may not be maintained or clearly marked.

Mt. Bailey

While at Diamond Lake, take a ride up Mt. Bailey in a snowcat and tear up fresh backcountry powder on the

For those looking to explore closer to town, there's a wide variety of sports facilities and beautiful parks that sit along the Umpqua River, as well as several 18-hole golf courses.

Parks

Most of the parks in town are located right along the river and make for the perfect setting for those sunny summer days. Stewart Park is central to Roseburg and is home to miles of walking paths, playgrounds, the Half Shell, a golf course, and a disc golf course. Fir Grove Park, which sits on the other side of the South Umpqua River from Stewart Park, has soccer fields, a playground and a kids splash pad that operates during the summer months. River Forks Park is an expansive park that's located where the North Umpqua River and the South Umpqua River join to form the main Umpqua River. The park includes swimming, multiple pavilions, picnic tables, grills, the Discovery Garden, three playgrounds including one that is handicapaccessible, and a splash pad. River Forks Park also has camping available at Twin Rivers Vacation Park.

Road Cycling

Roseburg and the Umpqua Valley are a cyclist's dream with gorgeous rolling hills and straight farmland stretches. The Umpqua Valley's wine country is also prime road-cycling country, featuring rural highways with minimal motorcar traffic. Check out cycleumpqua.com for suggested routes, umpquavelo. org for weekly rides, and check Experience Roseburg's event listings for local cycling events.

Disc Golf

Whistler's Bend County Park features a 27-hole disc golf course that often gets referred to as the most difficult course in Oregon. That shouldn't stop you from playing this course, each hole offers up beautiful scenics of the park and of the North Umpqua River.

Central to Roseburg is River Front Park Disc Golf which runs along the scenic South Umpqua River and between gorgeous oak trees.

Golf

If you're ready to hit the links, Roseburg is home to three 18-hole golf courses. Stewart Park Course is open to the public and is nestled in the center of town. The Roseburg Country Club is a private course that sits next to the North Umpqua River. Bar Run is a brand new 18-hole course in town designed by esteemed golf course designer Dan Hixson.

Sports facilities

Roseburg's Stewart Park not only has a golf course and disc golf course, but also a large tennis facility and a rollerskating rink. Both indoor and outdoor tennis courts, as well as the skating rink, are available for public use. Head to Legion Field at Stewart Park to throw back some popcorn and take in America's greatest pastime with Roseburg's Doc Stewarts AAA baseball team or Umpqua Community College's River Hawks baseball team.

Birding

Break out the binoculars. Douglas County is a birders' paradise with a diverse array of habitats available. Approximately 400 species have been recorded. Annually, an old chimney at Roseburg's Umpqua Valley Arts Center acts as a hotel for thousands of migrating Swifts. OUTDOORS

Beauty fron AShe


40 to 50 MPH winds, 90-plus-degree temperatures, extremely dry fuels and low relative humidities were the DNA behind the monster that ravished the Umpgua National Forest in 2020.

On September 6, 2020, the National Weather Service issued a "Red Flag" warning for much of western Oregon and in the early morning of September 8, visible flames east of Roseburg near Glide were called in to dispatch.

While crews were working to slow the growth of the first fire, two other fires further east on Highway 138 merged and exploded. It was 7:30 a.m. that the Archie Creek Fire began and within eight hours it grew to 30,000 acres - 62.5 acres a minute. Later that same day, the Archie Creek Fire spread to 100,000 acres.

With a combination of state, private and federal land involved, a vast majority of the local community from foresters to landowners to firefighters came together and worked tirelessly for the weeks following. The Archie Creek Fire is the largest wildfire on record in Douglas County, topping out at 131,542 acres.

What Visitors Should Know

Although the estimated containment date for the devastating Archie Creek Fire was October 31, 2020 efforts to reforest and rebuild began when the fire was still burning and are still underway. Visitors will still see the after-effects of the burn, but look closer and you'll also see new growth and a glimpse of a beautiful, green future for the Umpgua National Forest.

Because of such a rapid response from local timber companies, a large percentage of what was burned has been salvaged. Local timber company, Lone Rock Resources, had 8,000 acres burned. The company recently accomplished reforestation of their grounds - planting 2.4 million trees, some of which will be 5 to 6 feet tall by the end of 2022. "People have really stepped up on the reforestation efforts and it's been pretty amazing. In 5 years, it's going to look gorgeous," said Lone Rock **Resources Land Manager, Joe Newton.**

As pioneers of new wines in the country, innovators of farming techniques, and worldwide award-winners for local products it is true to say you can experience the highest-quality, most unique, and freshest sustenance in the world in Roseburg.



150 Years of Umpeua Wine



On October 3, 1872, Roseburg became officially incorporated by the state of Oregon making Roseburg 150 years old. World-renowned Umpqua Valley Wine has been there since the beginning. If the soil could talk – oh, the stories it would tell. Just about as soon as Roseburg was put on the map, vines were put in the ground. The Umpqua Valley's winegrowing history dates back to the 1880s when German immigrant, Adam Doerner, moved to Roseburg after working a year for the oldest-operating vineyard in Napa, Beringer Bros. He purchased land in Melrose and planted the first wine grapes in the region. Rumor has it that Doerner never drank water – only wine.

Doerner grew zinfandel, riesling and a sauvignon varietal from European grape stock. The farm also produced a fruit orchard, hay, ranching cattle and sheep. After Adam Doerner's passing in the 1920s, his son Adolph took over and decided to make Doerner Winery an official commercial winery. His wine was called "Melrose" or often known as "Doerner Dew" and was a fortified blend of riesling, pinot gris and pinot blanc. It was considered light and fruity, with a good balance of sweetness. The winery produced about 7,000 gallons per year until it closed in the 1960s. Richard Sommer then

purchased Doerner's equipment for his winery - HillCrest Vineyard.

Sommer founded the still-thriving HillCrest Vineyard in 1961, making it the oldest continuallyoperating post-prohibition estate winery in Oregon. Sommer was also the first to plant pinot noir Sommer was also the first to plant pinot noir vines in Oregon, making HillCrest the birthplace of Oregon pinot noir.

vines in Oregon, making HillCrest the birthplace of Oregon pinot noir.

By 1969, winemaking in Roseburg started to boom and the Oregon Winegrowers Association for the Umpqua Valley was established. By the 1970s, many of the local wineries still in the area today were born, including Henry Estate Winery – a name not only recognized for its wine, but also recognized globally for the development of Henry's unique trellis system.

Umpqua Valley's AVA (American Viticultural Area) was founded in 1984 and hasn't stopped growing. Now, the Umpqua Valley hosts three separate AVAs: Elkton, Red Hill and Umpqua. The region is currently closing in on 4,000 acres of vineyards, nearly 30 familyowned-and-operated wineries, and over 40 different wine varieties.

Reustle-Prayer Rock Vineyards: First in America to make Grüner Veltliner

Great Northwest Wine's 22nd annual Platinum Awards awarded the Umpqua Valley's Reustle-

Northwest Wine called winemaker, Stephen Reustle, "the American guru of Grüner," and said his wine is one of the United States' most decorated wines. Reustle-Prayer Rock Vineyards is the first winery in

the United States to plant, grow, and commercially vinify this Australian white grape. Reustle-Prayer Rock Vineyards has brought in over 500 national and international wine awards.

Abacela: Pioneer of America's Tempranillo

Abacela wine owners, Hilda and Earl Jones, landed in Douglas County after a very thorough quest to find why America wasn't producing Spain's signature Tempranillo wine. With their precise site-matching research, they found the Umpqua Valley held the most promise of near-perfect homoclimes to Rioja and Ribera. Abacela is now known for being pioneers for the Tempranillo and Albariño in America and has inspired others in Oregon, the Pacific Northwest and across the USA to plant and produce these new wines. In addition, Abacela grew, produced and bottled the first (or among the first) single varietal Syrah, Grenache, Viognier, Dolcetto, Petit Verdot, Touriga Nacional, Sangiovese and Nebbiolo in the state of Oregon. Among many of the winery's recognitions, Abacela's 2005 Tempranillo Reserve won America's 1st Gold Medal in Spain's 2009 Tempranillo al Mundo Competition and in 2015, the Jones' became only the 10th recipients of the Oregon Wine Industry's highest honor, the Lifetime Achievement Award.

Farms& Markets

A paradise for produce

With a uniquely mild and forgiving climate and fairly isolated region, Douglas County is argued to be not only one of the best counties in Oregon to garden, but one of the top areas in the world.

Over the last 10 to 15 years, Douglas County has seen a 210-day frost-free period which is the best for the state of Oregon. On top of that, Douglas County's geographical location has a large advantage - being positioned in the south to make it warmer and being close to the ocean with no large mountains between the county and the ocean makes the winters very mild.

Additionally, the county has on average a 200-day growing season which makes it optimal for getting multiple crops off, as well as having one of the most diverse soil profile maps in the entire state with approximately 230 soil profiles. This makes it a prime location for those who have specific agricultural interests - such as wine growers.

Harvest Season

The Umpqua Valley farming season is abundant and stretches May through November. The early season at the end of May starts with strawberries and asparagus, and into June and July you'll get additional berries, cherries, peaches, summer squash, apricots, broccoli, bush beans, cabbage, cauliflower, cucumbers, nectarines, and plums. August and September welcome apples, corn, pears, prunes, peppers, tomatoes, and watermelon, while October and November bring Winter squash, walnuts and pumpkins.

Breweries



There is no question that Oregon knows its beer. As of 2021, Oregon had a total of 310 craft breweries, and while some argue Oregon may have peaked in its beer game, Roseburg is showing up to play with lengthy tap lists and creative new brews. Appropriately, Roseburg is known as the *untapped* gem of Southern Oregon. Many of its breweries are conveniently located right off Interstate 5 for an easy pit-stop or take-out (most of the breweries have growlers, cans and bottle sales onsite). With the variety of beers offered and with each brewery having a unique style, a weekend beer-trail trip is a must.

Old 99 Brewing Co. Every palate should be able to find a beer they enjoy since Old 99 offers a classic lineup from their pale ale to their popular For The Win IPA to their smooth stout. The tap room also includes locally-loved, Logger's Pizza, and is located minutes off Interstate 5 at 1810 NE Stephens St. in Roseburg.

Two Shy Brewing's tap list is extensive and experimental. Rest assured, beer drinkers who like to stick to their staples such as lighter brews or IPAs will have plenty of options, but Two Shy Brewing will make those who want to expand their taste buds feel like a kid in a candy store. Two Shy Brewing has crafted rare and reputable beers from a Hibiscus Fig saison to a hazelnut hefeweizen to their Mt. Thielsen Sunrise golden coffee stout. Anticipate doing at least a couple tasting trays. Two Shy Brewing is also located right off Interstate 5 at 1308 NW Park St., Suite 100 in Roseburg. There is a food truck on site daily, with weekend music and events happening often. Families and pets are welcome. Cruising over to the coast? Check out Two Shy Brewing's second location at 473 Fir Ave., in Reedsport.

Backside Brewing Co. is a favorite local hangout with a hefty selection of IPAs as well as other crowd-pleasing brews such as the blonde, pale ale and stout. Backside Brewing makes wood-fired pizza onsite that pairs perfectly with a pint or two, and has other food items available in addition to hard alcohol, wine and Backside-brewed root beer. Families and pets are welcome to this chill outdoor and indoor atmosphere located at 1640 NE Odell Ave., in Roseburg. Backside Brewing Co. also has a second location at 105 W Central Ave., in Sutherlin.

Lookingglass Brewery is located southwest of Roseburg in Winston. The brewery is a perfect stop for those visiting the neighboring Wildlife Safari. Lookingglass has a variety of northwest favorites on tap and often has live music and food trucks. They are located at 192 SE Main St. in Winston. All ages are welcome.

Draper Brewing is nestled in historic downtown Roseburg and nails it when it comes to farmhouse ales and sours, as well as clean porters and IPAs. Draper is located at 640 SE Jackson Street and is open for those 21 and older.

North Forty Beer Co. is another must-visit in downtown Roseburg. The atmosphere is an inviting, pub-style restaurant celebratory of Douglas County culture. Roll-up garage doors let in the summer breeze and a variety of live music frequently fills the stage. All ages are welcome and food is available alongside a good-sized beer list. The brewery is located at 435 SE Jackson St.

Salud Brewery turns food and drink into an art. Salud not only produces a handful of craft beers from their small-batch brewery, but also serves up Latininspired dishes and signature cocktails. All ages are welcome and the brewery is located at 723 SE Lane Ave. in Roseburg.





Galleries & Workshops

Paint your visit to Roseburg with the flare of local art. Umpqua Valley Arts campus sits majestically in Fir Grove Park in Roseburg. The community arts center operates art gallery spaces, a workshop studio, a fullsized pottery studio, and a retail shop full of local, handmade artwork. The arts center also hosts a number of community events, classes, exhibits and more for all ages. Located in downtown Roseburg, Gallery Northwest is an art studio operated by 15 artists and features artwork in a variety of mediums; showcasing original paintings, pottery, jewelry, assemblage, and beautiful wood carvings. Anyone can be an artist at downtown Roseburg's Create and Sip Studio, offering public painting classes and events, as well as at Tuck's Place which offers do-it-yourself ceramics.

Theater

Watch Roseburg's stage actors tread the floorboards as they perform throughout the year. The Umpqua Actors Community Theatre puts on a handful of productions throughout the year as well as other events, including a local talent show. Theater productions are also produced quarterly at Umpqua Community College and performed at the Centerstage Theatre of the Whipple Fine Arts Building. For dinner and a show stop by The Grand Victorian Theatre in Myrtle Creek, a community-based venue known for their interactive dinner theatre. The theatre also hosts plays and other entertainment year-round. For vintage viewing, check out The Oakland Community Theater - Douglas County's only melodrama theater.




Art Festivals

The Umpqua Valley Arts center has been hosting the Annual Summer Arts Festival for more than 50 years. The festival brings in over 130 local and regional artists offering hand-crafted works in all media, a Kid's Zone, community art, entertainment, music, food, and more. The Douglas County Christmas Craft Fair is the largest Christmas craft fair in Southern Oregon with around 300 booths featuring a large variety of gifts and crafts. The Annual Lavender Festival and Farm Tour at Growing Miracles Lavender Garden in July brings in more than 30 local vendors, includes lavender u-pick, wreath making classes, yoga in the lavender, and allows guests to stroll around 3,500 lavender plants.

Whether you enjoy history, hiking, nature or fun local events - Roseburg and the greater Umpqua Valley has something to offer everyone.

Take a Trip Back in Time

The award-winning **Douglas County Museum of Natural & Cultural History** is fun for all ages as exhibits depict 8,000 years of Native American culture, pioneer history and the natural history that makes the Umpqua Valley special. There are plenty of activities for kids, but the animal exhibits alone will keep them entertained. For museum hours, admission and tour information call 541-957-7007 or visit UmpquaValleyMuseums.org.

Check out the first city in Oregon to establish a Historic District: Oakland, Oregon. In Oakland, you can experience historic buildings, homes, pioneer cemeteries, tons of antique stores, art and gift shops, wine tasting, fine dining, and the Oakland Museum.

Travel back in time at one of Douglas County's six historic covered bridges. Each has its own story to tell: The Neal Lane Covered Bridge; The Horse Creek Covered Bridge; The Cavitt Creek Bridge; The Milo Academy Covered Bridge; The Pass Creek Bridge; and The Rochester Covered Bridge. Graffiti Weekend is a favorite annual event in Roseburg and the premier car show event in the Pacific Northwest bringing in more than 1,000 classic cars and trucks. Graffiti Weekend is packed with back-to-back cruises, competitions and shows. This is a not-to-be missed event for classic car lovers that takes place the second weekend in July.

Fort Umpqua is a replica of the original trading fort and the southernmost outpost of the Hudson's Bay Company. Fort Umpqua is located at the **Elkton Community Education Center**, which is packed with activities and has a number of annual history-centered events to check out. While you're there, check out the gardens and **The Outpost Café**.

For the Nature Lovers

The Umpqua National Forest is known for its variety of gorgeous wildflowers and plants. A favorite nature trail for schools and families is Nature Trail #1508 that starts out from the eastern end of **Wolf Creek Campground**, crossing over Little River on a footbridge and showcases the area's lush flora. Founded in 1965, the **Glide Wildflower Show** is the largest display of native flora in the northwest with over 600 species of flowers, shrubs and other plants. The event takes place annually at the end of April.

The **Elkton Butterfly Pavilion** flight room provides guests the opportunity to view all the life stages of Monarch and Painted Lady butterflies, as well as an extensive outdoor butterfly garden. The Pavilion is located at the Elkton Education Community Center and has butterflies June through September. While here, take a walk through their gardens that showcase native Oregon plants from around the state.

Just south of Roseburg in the town of Winston is one of the west coast's top attractions: **Wildlife Safari**. Sprawling across 615 beautiful, hillside acres, visitors get an up-close-and-personal drive-through safari with more than 500 free-roaming animals from around the world, including many endangered species. Enjoy a pint at **North Forty Brewing**, taste some wines at **The Wine Destination** or the **Trella Vineyards** tasting room, or perhaps enjoy happy hour on the rooftop at **Brix Grill**. Make your way back toward Main Street for an intimate setting and a great selection of food and drinks at **True Kitchen and Bar**. For some cool, late-night vibes, walk over to the **SunnySide Theatre** for live music and cocktails.

Saturday

Right next door to the Flats, pick up a steaming coffee, some homemade pastries or a breakfast burrito at **Gathering Grounds Coffee House** before your tee time at the new Dan Hixson-designed golf course, **Bar Run Golf and RV Resort**. If you've hit cherry season in late spring/early summer, make sure to stop at the Guido Orchards fruit stand as you exit the golf course. Head about ten minutes north to JosephJane Winery where there is a casual, outdoor atmosphere with woodfired pizza and a wide variety of wine. Then spend the afternoon in the gorgeous Umpqua Valley tasting wine at several nearby wineries such as Reustle-Prayer Rock Vineyards, Henry Estate Winery, Becker Vineyard, Cooper Ridge Vineyard, or Knostman Family Winery. On the way back downtown, visit Two Shy Brewing for a hefty list of taps, local wine selections, hearty food, and quite often live music. Get your hands in the game for some post-dinner fun at The Blade Axe House.

Brunch at **The Parrott House** is a must after a leisurely morning. After checking out of central Roseburg with a full stomach, soak in the amazing scenery by heading out east on Highway 138 where you'll find a dozen waterfalls, a variety of hiking trails, the **North Umpqua River**, as well as **Diamond Lake** and **Crater Lake National Park**. Having now discovered a wilderness paradise, extend your trip and go glamping at **Umpqua's Last Resort** or grab a river-view cabin at **Steamboat Inn**.

Friday

Feel like you're far out of town by checking into a cottage on the scenic riverfront property of **Bar** Run Golf and RV Resort. Only minutes away, pop into downtown for a scoop of locally-made Umpqua Dairy Ice Cream or fudge at Umpqua Sweets and **Treats**. Burn off some sugar by cruising around the downtown shops such as Heroes Haven where comicbook enthusiasts will find more than 100,000 comics and collectibles. You'll find something for everyone in the family at **The People's Goods** and **Jackson** Street Provisions with their wide selection of locallymade foods, crafts and various items. The fun, eclectic atmosphere and wood-fired pizza at Old Soul Pizza in downtown is the perfect spot for dinner or park it old-school style at Pete's Drive-In off Harvard Avenue on the way back to Bar Run. If you're not ready for a nightcap, take the family to **TenDown Bowling and** Splitz Family Grill for bowling, arcade games, and great food and drinks.

Saturday

After grabbing some coffee and breakfast to-go at My **Coffee**, travel a short distance to **Stewart Park** for a prime picnic spot and walking paths along the river, as well as a large playground and disc golf course. Walk the path to **Fir Grove Park** where a splash pad keeps kids cool in the summer months and where **Umpqua** Valley Arts has community art exhibits, classes and events. Across the street, on Harvard Avenue, you'll find the Umpqua Valley Farmers' Market which is open all year and offers a plethora of local vendors. Then buckle up for a thrilling adventure at **Wildlife Safari** in Winston where hundreds of animals roam free as you drive through the 615-acre park. After, check out the walk-around Safari Village with animals, events, a playground, and a cafe for lunch. Take the gorgeous, scenic route back into Roseburg (from Wildlife Safari) by taking Lookingglass Road to Colonial Road and onto Melrose Road where you'll

Sunday

A hearty breakfast at **Brix Grill** downtown is the way to start the day. After breakfast, head east on Highway 138 to **Fall Creek Trail**. The trail is considered an easy, mile-long and beautiful hike for families with a wooden bridge and waterfall. A bit farther east, make time to see the deepest lake in America, **Crater Lake**. History and exploration can also be found closer to town at the **Douglas County Museum**. The museum has an impressive amount of artifacts, antiques and historic displays that are engaging for children and adults including the largest natural history display in Oregon and the second largest historic photograph collection. The most popular exhibits include the full-size Saber-toothed Cat skeleton, a Woolly Mammoth skull and tusk, an American Lion skull and an Ancient Bison skull.

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
